Pastor's Corner

Co-travelers in Christ,

If you ever drive past the parsonage you may have noticed a new mulch-covered island in the middle of our front vard. On one of those rare warm Saturday afternoons in March, Sybil and I decided to get out in the yard, get our hands dirty, and do some planting (and transplanting). One of the things I wanted most was white crocuses—white flowers that I could be reasonably sure would sprout for Easter. But these last few days of March had me wondering: will they make it? We had that unexpected snow storm that got me worrying if I planted them too early, and then all of that rain that might have frozen into ice on a few of the colder nights around the tender roots. Maybe I should have waited? Maybe I should have spent a little time talking with that gardener at the nursery? The lilies nearby are starting to spring from the ground and so are the irises and the beginnings of the bleeding heart, but right up until the last minute, I wasn't sure that those crocuses would make it. But then, on Wednesday of Holy Week, I saw that two of the four were about to send up their flowers, and then, the next day, a third. As I write this, it's beginning to look as though all of those second guesses and worries over weather and timing can be put to the side. It looks like we're going to have a flower garden sprouting on Easter despite the poor planning of this amateur gardener.

If you're like me, maybe you have a tendency to fool yourself into thinking from time to time that everything depends on you. If I don't do this right or that on time, none of those other things can ever come to be. If I don't execute, account for all of the variables correctly, see around corners, time things just right the world will fall apart and it will be my fault. And then you plant crocuses...and despite your poorest planning and best efforts to drown the bulbs, they spring to life beautifully anyway. Here, I think, is one of the most profound lessons of Easter. God's intentions that there will be life (and life abundantly!) are beyond our ability to spoil, accidentally mess up, ruin because of poor planning or because we're having a bad day (or a bad few years). The victory of life announced at Jesus' rising is beyond our ability to thwart despite our best efforts, despite the Sanhedrin's best efforts, despite Pilate's best efforts...and thank God for that! What a grace that something this important is beyond our ability to control! What a grace that something of such beauty doesn't depend on me! As you take notice this year of what is springing up from the ground all around you, I

hope that thought, that prayer might dwell in your hearts and minds for a while and give you peace with the things that you're holding that you think are in your power (but aren't), and may Easter's reminder of God's intentions for life renew your spirit in the joy of being alive. And may it remind you as well that today is a blessed gift—not to control or worry about or seek with our own power to preserve as if we were its author—but to give thanks for and sing praise for. That is Easter's awakening.



Protect Vulnerable Immigrant Youth Act From Voice

Throughout the United States, many religious workers, including some clergy in the New England Conference, and migrant children are having to live in limbo due to a visa backlog. This has and is creating great harm to the security of those subject to the backlog.

In a <u>Nov. 16, 2023, message to the Conference</u>, Bishop Peggy Johnson urged United Methodists in New England to support for the *Protect Vulnerable Immigrant Youth Act*, which would exempt special immigrant juvenile status (SIJS youth) from EB-4 visa caps and release visas for religious workers supporting vital work in our community.

We encourage you **to write to your representatives** and ask them to support this much-needed legislation. Without measures to address this backlog, some of our own pastors may lose their path to citizenship and may even be forced to leave the United States.

Let's raise our voices and be heard on this vital issue of justice.

You can join the effort in support of religious workers and migrant children by writing your representatives asking them to vote for this legislation. You can write your own letter or use one of the templates linked below.

Family Life

Spring has sprung! April is poetry month and I'm sharing a delight by Pablo Neruda. I love washing babies. There's something precious about each finger, each toe and the crown of the head. I love washing feet and this foot-washing I shared with some of you during Riverwalk Spiritual practices during our Fall series. There's a vulnerability and trust and wholeness between those who wash and those who are washed. Jesus was a wisdom teacher and in John 13 calls us to wash each other's feet:

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had reclined again, he said to them, "Do you know what | have done to you?¹³ You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for that is what | am. ¹⁴ So if |, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵ For | have set you an example, that you also should do as | have done to you. ¹⁶ Very truly, | tell you, slaves are not greater than their master, nor are messengers ^[d] greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷ |f you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

TO WASH A CHILD

by Pablo Neruda Only the most ancient love on earth will wash and comb the statue of the children, straighten the feet and knees. The water rises, the soap slithers, and the pure body comes up to breathe the air of flowers and motherhood. Oh, the sharp watchfulness, the sweet deception, the lukewarm struggle! Now the hair is a tangled pelt criscrossed by charcoal, by sawdust and oil, soot, wiring, crabs, until love, in its patience, sets up buckets and sponges, combs and towels, and, out of scrubbing and combing, amber, primal scrupulousness, jasmines,

primal scrupulousness, jasmines, has emerged the child, newer still, running from the mother's arms to clamber again on its cyclone, go looking for mud, oil, urine and ink, hurt itself, roll about on the stones. Thus, newly washed, the child springs into life,

for later, it will have time for nothing more than keeping clean, but with the life lacking.

Consider washing a loved ones hands or feet. I like to make a mix of 2C Epsom salts, 1C baking soda and 10 drops of frankincense or lavender for a whole bath so adjust according to your basin. Use a cloth to gently clean and dry and talk about why Jesus calls us to do this. Did you know the pastor's stole is a symbol of servant leadership to remember Jesus command?

We will learn about God as creator and how he calls us to tend the earth and sow seeds of love into the ground and into human hearts.

Did you know? Most people throw away their used sneakers every 125-200 days without ever thinking about recycling. Since sneakers are manufactured with materials that are not biodegradable, they remain in landfills or are incinerated, which leads to toxic chemicals in our air and soil.

The process of making sneakers produces large amounts of CO2 which contributes to serious effects of climate change and global warming. Recycling and reusing sneakers keeps sneakers out of landfills, reduces the need for manufacturing new shoes and sneakers, and supports a growing circular economy. (gotsneakers? Website)




If you are unable to take advantage of the **AudioFetch** option, we also have personal amplification devices available in the sound booth. These devices are simple to use and include headphones.
