Pastor's Corner

Co-travelers in Christ,

One thing that I've learned about myself in adulthood is that I am a creature of habit. I come by it honestly—I come from a family (on both sides) that likes organization and patterns and that finds comfort in regular rhythms that tame life's chaos into a steady, regular beat. One of the ways that that has shown up in my ministry, I've noticed, is that on certain days and in certain times of year there are hymns that I just have to sing, and foremost among those is the one that comes first for me on the first Sunday of the church year, every year. The first hymn that I select for the first Sunday in Advent is always "People, Look East" (UMH 202). At first, it came about as a bit of a coincidence—I would sit in my chair with all of my notes and all of my thoughts, think through the lesson of the day and the tone of the service, consider what candle was going to be lit on the advent wreath, and try to approach Advent worship each new year with fresh eyes and fresh perspective. And every single year I found myself coming to the same conclusion—"People, Look East" comes first. Despite all of my attempts at new perspective and originality and despite every intention to mix things up a little each new pass around the sun, I was always coming to the same conclusion.

The title of that hymn, for me, sounds jarring—it's a shout and a command: People! Wake Up! Snap out of your day-to-day preoccupations! Lift your heads up! Look East!—and the four stanzas invite its singers to think afresh about what preparation might mean from different angles and using distinct and rich imagery. We're looking east, it tells us, because we're beginning our preparations to receive a visitor, who goes by the name of Guest, Rose, Star, and Lord and what a different thing it is to make preparations for the coming of a Guest, a Rose, a Star, and a Lord. For one I might clean the house; for another I might loosen soil and fertilize the ground; for the third I don't know—but an expensive telescope? Prepare for the apocalypse?; and then there's preparing for a Lord. In recognizing this pattern I have, I decided that it's long past time to dive deeper into what fascinates me about this hymn and so I'm going to be preaching through it, stanza-by-stanza, through Advent this year, and one of the things that I would like to ask of you as you enter Advent to the call and command to lift your gaze and look eastward, is to do some tilling of the soil of your imagination. Prepare them to think

and imagine with new images, new metaphors. Prepare them to be in a mode of engaged wonder—maybe you could walk lockstep with the preparation calls of the hymn by mimicking it's call toward preparations each week through each stanza of the hymn. For week 1, clean the house and, as you do, engage with that activity in a different way—you're preparing for the Guest and transforming your activity into a spiritual exercise. For week 2, plant something—take time with it, pray with it, engage with it as though you are preparing a space in the world for the Rose that arrives with beauty. Week 3 will be the week we look for a star and it just so happens that that very week will be the darkest week of the calendar year. There will be plenty of night sky available, plenty of stars to look at in that week leading up to Christmas. Take an opportunity one evening that week (at least) to go outside, look up at the night sky, experience the "frosty weather" (as the hymn says) and pray with that great parable of light entering darkness that we find in John 1:1-18. And then, on Christmas Eve, having tried out those different ways of preparing, we're going to join together in worship to see what it might be to prepare for a Lord.

There will be lots of activity around the church for this season. I am going to hold a seasonal study twice a week—Tuesdays and Thursdays as noon and at 5pm through Advent—to look at the themes and scriptures of the week together. We will continue our Wednesday potluck book study and include in that some singing of favorite carols. We will have our Christmas Fair this Saturday (12/2), our annual Christmas concert on 12/17 at 4pm, our annual Blue Christmas service on 12/22 at 7pm, and Christmas Eve will include a morning

combined service at 10:30 and evening services at 5, 7, and 11pm. What a great season to ready our hearts!

Support the Protect Vulnerable Immigrant Youth Act

From Bishop Johnson

I am writing to urge you, the pastors and laity of the New England Conference, to speak up on behalf of vulnerable youth and religious workers who are in the immigration process.

Please ask your Senators and Congressional Representatives to support the **Protect Vulnerable Immigrant Youth Act**. A recent proposal in Congress puts visas for vulnerable youth and religious workers in the same category that would allow very few to become citizens.

Without the *Protect Vulnerable Immigrant Youth Act* some of our own pastors will not be able to complete the immigration process and will lose their path to citizenship; some may even be forced to leave the United States.

Please use the link below to let your voice be heard.

In addition to the text provided, you can include a personal note. If you want to do more, you can call your lawmakers and stress that this is an issue of justice and needs their consideration and support.

If you don't know who your lawmakers are, this form will identify them for you

when you fill in your mailing address.

I encourage you to bring this link with you to church and invite everyone to support this vital legislation to protect religious workers and vulnerable youth. Your voice can make a difference.

Speaking Out Against Hate Crime

Over the weekend three college students of Palestinian descent were shot in Burlington, Vermont. Two of them are U.S. citizens and the third is a legal resident.

Two of the three victims were wearing a keffiyeh, which is a symbol of Palestinian nationalism, and were speaking in Arabic when they were approached by a white man who opened fire.

The three are hospitalized. The New York Times reports two are in stable condition, the third sustained more serious injuries.

A suspect has been arrested and this is being investigated as a possible hate crime. The FBI is participating in the probe along with other agencies. To Pg 7

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

It is important, always, to call attention to incidents like this one. If it is found to be a hate crime, our voices must be among those decrying violence driven by hate and fear, Such acts are on the rise in recent weeks. The United Methodist Social Principles state: "We deplore acts of hate or violence against groups or persons based on race, color, national origin, ethnicity, age, gender, disability, status, economic condition, sexual orientation, gender identity or religious affiliation." (Paragraph 162).

The UM Book of Resolutions calls us to address the systemic roots of hate crimes: "If we look at these as acts of individuals or groups of individuals, we will fail to recognize the systemic context of injustice that give rise to such acts."
