There is a hymn in the *United Methodist Hymnal* called "This Is a Day of New Beginnings" by Brian Wren and the first verse reads like this:

This is a day of new beginnings, time to remember and move on, time to believe what love is bringing, laying to rest the pain that's gone.

As we move into a new year and prepare for whatever new beginnings 2023 may bring, it seems to me that there is something important and true in the lyrics that Wren has written. New beginnings do ask us to put a marker of sorts down on our internal calendars—markers that snip time in two allowing us to separate what's past from what lies ahead, markers that help us to remember from today's vantagepoint, and then also to move on. And what strikes me as particularly insightful as I sing this hymn in my heart today is what the third line says about the *way* we move on: "time to believe what love is bringing." Wow. The way that hits me as I hear it today, it sounds like the gentle, yet firm, call of God to move forward. It's time—don't you think it's time that you start believing what love is bringing? I mean, really, don't you think it's time? It's time.

Isaiah is the book of the Old Testament that crops up most frequently in the lectionary calendar this time of year, and there is a passage in Isaiah 43:18-19 that speaks powerfully to this sentiment. It reads:

¹⁸ Do not remember the former things or consider the things of old.
¹⁹ I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth; do you not perceive it?
I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.

The prophet is speaking to a people worn down in exile—a people that, by this time I imagine, could often find themselves utterly distraught and discouraged by long years in servitude and homelessness by the rivers of Babylon and you can just imagine what their weary cried might have

sounded like: "When we will ever go home again? When will we be given our new beginning?" This was a people, perhaps, with too many memories—enough to positively drown them in the past and choke out their ability to live hopefully toward the future. It is that sort of drowning in the past that Isaiah speaks to here when he tells them to no longer remember the former things. He's telling them to make a break with the past so they can begin to look for God's new thing.

It's hard to imagine better advice for making a new beginning when the "former things" threaten to drown out our ability to live forward with faith and hope and claim in our own hearts what love is bringing. May this year's new beginning be a time for you to claim what love is bringing! It's time.

Lay Training

A goal for the Committee on Lay Leadership (AKA Nominations) for 2023 is to do more in the way of training and equipping the laity at MUMC. We will be using the Lay Servant Ministry Basic Course as a way to start this process.

Lay Servant Ministries is one of the most significant lay leadership development programs available within the United Methodist connection. Through this equipping and empowering system, lay servants have the opportunity to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ who then go and make other disciples.

Laity are the primary agents of holy love incarnate in the world. As noted in the UM Discipline: "The witness of the laity, their Christ-like examples of everyday living as well as the sharing of their own faith experiences of the gospel, is the primary evangelistic ministry through which all people will come to know Christ and The United Methodist Church will fulfill its mission" In this sense, lay discipleship is always leadership and leadership is always evangelism—because all who follow Jesus lead others to him. Laity, you and me, are called to be disciples and disciples lead others to Christ. Discipleship begins with relationship. When we "see all the people" God calls us to love, we discover that engaging relationships with others are more than marching orders for outreach and mission: they are the very source of our own spiritual growth and a means of grace. This might sound daunting, but this course really prepares you to become more comfortable making and sharing in these relationships.

Lay Servant Ministry, the Basic Course, is foundational for all courses in Lay Servant Ministries. I will be facilitating this course for anyone who is interested, starting January 22, from 3-5:30 p.m., and continuing 1/29-2/13 (home in time for the Super Bowl). Participants are encouraged to discover and employ personal spiritual gifts as God intended and to consider the importance of exercising servant leadership, developing future leaders, remaining rooted in consistent spiritual practices, and being part of a group that holds members accountable in their discipleship.

The Participants handbook is about \$12.00 and pre-class reading will be chapter 1 –2. The book is available on Amazon for \$11 and I could do a bulk order as long as you sign up for the course by 1/7/2023.

Pre-class activity also includes a Spiritual gifts inventory that is available at Discipleship Ministries | Spiritual Gifts Inventory (umcdiscipleship.org)

Going Out of Our Way!

In mid-2022, Mediterranean Shipping Company, a world leader in container transport, voluntarily changed its routes, on the advice of scientists, to protect large populations of blue whales off the Sri Lankan coast. Going out of its way 15 nautical miles has led to a whopping 95% drop in whale strikes.

Jesus counseled people to go out of their way for one another, especially for the vulnerable: "If anyone would sue you and take your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles." Further, "whoever gives one of these little ones even a cup of cold water ... will by no means lose his reward" (Matthew 5:40-41; 10:42, ESV).

Paul likewise urged his listeners to voluntarily give up eating meat, even if they didn't believe in and weren't challenged by the idols to which it had been sacrificed, for the sake of new believers with weaker faith (Romans 14).

Faith calls us to go out of our way for the sake of others; sometimes a wealthy corporation opts to do the same. God's hand is at work in both, protecting vulnerable humans and non-humans alike.


