Siblings in Christ,

As I sit down to write, I just witness the very last leaf from the sugar maple outside of our front window fall to the ground. The very last one—they're all gone now, all strewn about on the lawn and matted down wet. The wind and the rain lately have ensured that at least this tree's yearly crop is finally fully surrendered, a bit early maybe, so that the tree can get on with the rest of its yearly business. To look at it against the backdrop of all of the Fall color that remains, somehow the tree looks less dead or dormant than it does happy to turn the page—an overachiever, an early bird. It has lain down its multicolored leaves almost as an accomplishment. It has made its way successfully through another year, it has taken full stock, and has handed in its end-of-year report early. Its report tells the story of sunny days and rainy days and droughts, all somehow encoded within the color and crispness of each little leaf.

It's November and the leaves aren't the only end-of-year reports coming due—there are real ones, literal ones, as well. Some painstaking. Some that will require a little research. There is one, though, that I would submit is the most vital of all and not just for knowing clearly where we've been. This one also sets the tone for where we're going. It's Thanksqiving, of course, and not just the day itself but the season, the attitude, the spirituality of being thankful people. Thankfulness is its own report of a kind. It requires us to look back and bring to mind specific events and occurrences. It requires that we think closely enough about those events and occurrences to appreciate them as thinks that we owe thanks to God for. It may require even, that we do enough data analysis to appreciate what our lives may have been like otherwise, without those gifts and blessings, in the absence of those events and occurrences that prod our hearts to render thanks. Thankfulness is its own end of year report and the best kind really. This one asks for your thoughtful attention to blessing and to grace; to the good things of your life. Every moment of research pays dividends in recognition. Can you see just yet just how good God has been to you this year? Have you crunched the numbers, discerned the shape of this year's story? Don't wait until November 24!

Our Privilege to Vote in Upcoming Midterm Elections

In a few days, we in the United States are entering another season of voting. It may not be a season of the church calendar, with liturgical colors, but it is a sacred season nonetheless.

As United Methodists, the right to vote is something we hold and view as sacred. It is our voice and representation while attempting to improve our country, participating in our communities, and making a difference for our families.

We affirm that "the strength of a political system depends upon the full and willing participation of its citizens" (**Social Principles ¶ 164.B**). Our Social Principles assert the belief that to have a viable, strong, and equitable government, the people must

participate without unnecessary hindrances and obstacles.

Our vote is one of our strongest vehicles to help express the hopes we have for our children, our grand-children and for us. It is a mechanism by which a government can truly be made up of by and for the people. As a democratic nation, to vote is to express trust in the processes and structure of the system.

However, a growing number of eligible voters don't vote because they view it as irrelevant, an unnecessary burden and just not worth the time to participate. This is partly because of unfounded "voter fraud" claims eroding trust in the government. Claims that create suspicion in the democratic process and second guessing the validity of systems to manage fair elections. On the contrary, in America, the election process has the most stringent structures, safeguards and protections in the world.

Even worse, we are living in a time when the right to vote is under attack. Insidious tactics to suppress voter turnout and disenfranchise communities of color have been implemented in multiple U.S. States. One of the biggest barriers to suppress the right to vote in the U.S. is "voter ID" restrictions. Confusion about voter ID can easily turn into disenfranchisement. Eligible voters must understand ID rules to cast a ballot within their State. View the Vote Riders site here to see the ID restrictions in your State.

During the upcoming midterm elections in the United States and elections taking place in parts of the world, we encourage United Methodists and people of faith to do what it takes to cast your votes and to root voting decisions in the principles espoused by the Author and Finisher of our faith, Jesus Christ. Might justice and peace guide you in your political activity and may your Christian witness be evident to all in your advocacy.

A Good Contagion

Thanksgiving is key in Christian prayer, but often our requests outweigh our thanks. By contrast, 85% of prayers in the Jewish prayerbook are blessings of thanks, according to Rabbi Evan Moffic. Noting that the Hebrew word for a Jewish person —

Yehudah — means "one who is grateful," he states, "Gratitude is at the core of how Jews pray."



Someone once asked Moffic if

he might know about a blessing he'd overheard at a restaurant. After a man proposed to his girlfriend and she said yes, he walked quietly to a corner, put on a yarmulke (a sacred Jewish head covering worn in prayer) and spoke a blessing. His fiancé teared up. The rabbi said the prayer was surely this: "Blessed are you, O God, sovereign of the universe, for giving us life, for sustaining us and for enabling us to reach this joy-filled moment."

Why was this person so interested? "I am planning to propose to my girlfriend," he shared with Moffic, "and I want to say this prayer with her."

Unbeknown to the newly engaged pair, their gratitude transformed another couple's life. When we give thanks to God, not only is our faith strengthened but our thanksgiving may inspire others. Gratitude is contagious!

Living with God in a one-story house

We often think of the universe as a twostory house, notes Orthodox Christian priest Stephen Freeman. "We live here on earth, the first floor, where ... everything operates according to normal, natural laws, while God lives in heaven, upstairs, and is largely removed from the story in which we live." Most of the time we feel like we're all alone on our level of the world.

But, Freeman adds, God is "everywhere present and filling all things." Not that God's kingdom has fully come; we know that's not so. And not to discount the promise of eternity. But we don't live apart from God, even now. As Jacob said, "Surely the Lord is in this place. ... This is none other than the house of God" (Genesis 28:16-17).

How might our perceptions and behaviors change if we expected to run into God frequently, conversing and enjoying his company not only in prayer and worship but while working and relaxing? What a difference it makes when we live as roommates with God in a one-story world.




